

Properly washing and maintaining outerwear: when and how?

Outerwear is your silent helper in sports – it warms, protects from the weather and wicks moisture away from the body to help it evaporate. In order for textiles to do all of this for as long as possible, they must be maintained. It's very easy to treat the outerwear itself so that you can enjoy it for years to come. And the longer you use your sports gear, the better it is for the environment! For a quick overview of how to properly care for your ATOMIC product, we have assembled the washing instructions by category.

SOFTSHELL SKI CLOTHING

Softshell fabric ski clothing is very versatile and provides good weather protection in many conditions. It is elastic, warms up and is very robust. Proper care is important to keep these good characteristics for a long time. Most softshell materials are constructed from multiple layers of different functional fabrics and should be washed regularly to prevent perspiration residue, makeup, sunscreen or other contaminants from interfering with breathability.

HOW TO WASH YOUR SOFTSHELL CLOTHING

- Wash according to the washing instructions at a maximum of 40°C (unless otherwise noted on the label) using the “Hand wash” or “Wool” cycle. Otherwise, use an easy-care gentle cycle with a relatively high water level.
- Pre-treat particularly dirty areas, such as cuffs, collars or stains, with warm water and gentle (functional) detergent: Rub lightly with a soft sponge, let it take effect, rinse well.
- Empty pockets, close zippers and Velcro fasteners, undo drawstrings, turn garment inside out.
- All functional or softshell detergents or mild liquid detergents are suitable for softshells. Please do not use detergent powder, fabric softener or bleach!
- Load washing machine a maximum of two-thirds in order to be able to rinse carefully.
- If there is a larger load or heavy soiling, a second rinse cycle is recommended. All dirt and detergent residue must be washed out
- Spin-dry at a maximum of 800 RPMs

DRYING SOFTSHELLS

Air drying takes longer, but is best. To do this, hang the jacket, pants or vest on the clothesline or let the clothes dry lying down - preferably in the fresh air. Avoid direct sunlight and high heat. Softshells (see label) may usually also be placed in the dryer at low temperatures using a gentle cycle.
